Prof. Abdul Jabbar al-Rifai

An Iraqi thinker and professor of Islamic philosophy in Iraq, issued the magazine "Contemporary Islamic Issues" in 1997, which he headed, and published 68 issues and still publish today, the director of the Center for the study of philosophy of religion in Baghdad and adviser to the chair of UNESCO at the University of Kuffa, has discussed and supervised more From 60 PhD and MA in Philosophy, Speechology and Islamic Studies. Al-Rifa'i has many books, including: "Lectures in the Principles of Islamic Jurisprudence (two volumes), 2000,"

Principles of Islamic Philosophy (two volumes), 2001, "Introduction to the New Theological Question, 2005", "Modernization of the Literary and Philosophical Lessons in the Scientific Estate, 2010", "Saving the Humanism in Religion, 2012" and "Religion and Ecological Storms, 2015"

He was awarded several awards such as: Sheikh Hamad's First Achievement Award in International Understanding, for his pioneering intellectual achievement and its implications for the consolidation of the culture of knowledge and dialogue and the consolidation of the values of diversity, pluralism and coexistence, 14 December 2017, and the Golden Shield of the Cultural Movement in Antelias, Lebanon, for his role in enriching the cultural heritage of Lebanon and the Arab world in the year 2013. The Vatican's Pontifical Institute in Rome dedicated its 2012 book to a magazine of contemporary Islamic issu4es in recognition of itsrolein the modernization of religious thought in the last quarter century, and as the most important specialized journal of religions in Arabic. Al-Rifai holds a PhD in Islamic Philosophy with honors in 2005.



Abdullah Sayyed Wild Abah

A Mauritanian academic, thinker and professor of philosophy and studies at the Mauritanian University of Nouakchott since 1989 and a visiting professor at several Arab and international universities.

Abah teaches modern philosophy, philosophy of ethics, politics, religion, philosophy of law, linguistics, Islamic philosophy, philosophy of communication and media sciences. He also oversees the training of

secondary school teachers in philosophy and social sciences, in addition to University thesis and research. Abah also serves as a coordinator of Arab-Islamic cultural and civilizational dialogue programs, an advisor to the Supreme Council for Communication, a human development expert accredited to the United Nations, and secretary-general of the Mauritanian Society for Philosophical Studies and a writer for a weekly intellectual column for Asharq AlAwsat in the UAE since 2009

He has published several scientific works such as: Foko's History and Truth, Globalization Trends, Israel: the crisis of the Zionist project (jointly), the post-9/11 world, the obstacles to democratic transformation in the Arab world, the misery of prosperity (translation from French), Religion and Identity, the new Arab revolutions: track and destiny, Islam and the open society (translation), the political religious issue in modern Western thought, in addition to dozens of researches and articles published in Arab periodicals.



Ahmed Madi

Professor of Philosophy at the University of Jordan, former dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and the Faculty of Arts. He is the President of the Arab Philosophical Society since its establishment. He was the editor of the Arab Philosophical Magazine. He was the president of the Jordanian Writers' Association for two consecutive terms, editor-in-Chief of Afkar magazine, published by the Ministry of Culture, and Chairman of the Studies Committee in the Cultural Department of Greater Amman Municipality.

Madi is a member of the Arab National Congress and a member of the Advisory Board of the Arab Foundation for Intellectual Modernization. He has many studies and researches published in many fields.

Madi published the book "Secularism: Models of Modern and Contemporary Arab Thought", the first part of the project "Secularism in Modern and Contemporary Arab Thought" and "Salama Musa: Secularism and Religion" the second part and "Sata' Al Hadari: Secularism and Religion" the third part.



Mahboob Abdel Salam Mahboob

A Sudanese writer, researcher and leader of the Popular Congress, Mahboobassumed several positions namely: the director of the Department of Foreign Media in the Ministry of Information and Culture of Sudan 1990-1992, officer manager of the Secretary General of the Arab and Islamic People's Congress 1992-1996, and Secretary General of the Intellectual Works Commission 1996-2000. Worked as a lecturer in several European and American Universities 2009-2013.

Mahboob was the head of the news section at the Sudanese newspaper Al-Raya in 1986. He also worked for Al Youm Elsabe' magazine in Paris from 1986 to 1990 and started to publish a series of articles in the London Journal of Science since 1987. He has also published several articles at various times in Al-Hayat newspaper, Al-Sharq Al-Awsat newspaper and Al-Quds newspaper, as well as a large number of articles and researches in various magazines, newspapers and electronic media. "Islamic Liberation for Women", and "The Chapters of the Southern Sudanese Fire ", "The Pilgrimage and the Meaning(translated from English)" The Islamic Movement of Sudan The Spotlight, Dark threads (Contemplating the first 10 Year Rule of Inqath), and "A paper on Sudan after the Secession of the South" presented to the Aljazeera Studies Center, and "A paper on Soil School between Thought and Practice". Arab Center for Studies and Research Doha ", " Sudan Islamic Movement, "Hurriyat Al-Elektronia" newspaper, " The Sudan Paper Polarization or Confirmation, "the Sudanese Public Opinion" newspaper.

Mahboob graduated from the Faculty of Arts / Department of Philosophy from Cairo University in Khartoum in 1981. He holds a diploma in political science from Cardiff University (Britain) in 1983 and a Diploma in Advanced Studies (DEA) in Anthropology from Paris III University in 1989. Ali Mahafzeh

A Jordanian academic and diplomat, an Arabic thinker who has been able to combine high academic efficiency and research activity not only within the university but also outside it. He managed to succeed in many different fields and refused to join any government work as he preferred to stay focused on academic areas. He started work as a teacher for the Jordanian Ministry of Education and then became a diplomat at the Jordanian Ministry of Foreign Affairs - and worked at the embassies of Bonn, Tunis, Algeria, Paris and Cairo,

he then became an associate professor at the University of Jordan's History Department and a professor in modern history. He masters a number of foreign languages, namely English, French and German.

Mahafzeh has participated in many international conferences and has many works in international relations, historical studies and intellectual trends. He spent many years in diplomatic work in Bonn, Tunis, Algeria and Cairo until joining the University of Jordan in 1971.

Mahafazeh holds a BA in Arts from Damascus University, a Diploma in Education from the same university, a PhD in Islamic Studies from the Sorbonne III, and a Doctor of State in Arts and Human Sciences from Sorbonne I.



Ali Oumlil

Professor and lecturer at the Faculty of Arts and Humanities in Rabat. A prominent Arab philosopher, thinker, human rights activist, diplomat and political persona. A primary figure in the fields of Islamic historical methodology and Arab political thought, he is considered to be a pioneer in issues related to state formation in the Arab world. Ournlil has extensively studied the relationship between intellectual authority and political power, the sociological pluralism and its ideological interpretations as well as the reformist trends in Arab

contemporary thought.

Oumlil wrote 11 books, 3 of which were translated from Arabic to French. His writings are taught throughout the major universities of the MENA region and around the world, he co-founded the Moroccan Association for Human Rights in Rabat, which he chaired until 1985, He was also a member and co-founder of the Board of Directors of the Executive Committee of the Arab Institute for Human Rights in Tunis. He headed the Arab Institute for Human Rights in Cairo. He was elected as The Secretary General to the Board of Trustees of the Arab Thought Forum. He was appointed Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to Egypt and Ambassador to the Lebanese Republic. He participated in many seminars and has many works in both Arabic and French.

Oumlil holds a bachelor's degree in philosophy from Cairo University and joined the Sorbonne to work with the French scholar Roger Arnalds with a focus on Ibn Khaldun's methodology. He completed his doctorate in 1977.




Dr. Amer Adnan Alhafi

A Jordanian academic, Alhafi has published many scholarly works, including: Ibn Rushd's Influence on Christian Theology, Political Parties in Israel, Israeli Right Parties, Neighborly Love in Islam, Journal of the Pontifical Institute for Arab and Islamic Studies, Rome, 2004, Interpretation and public opinion at the Jewish sects, Fundamentalism in Religions, Augustus in the city of God, Nature and Natural Law, etc. He also participated in the design of training manuals for imams and preachers on the Amman Message by the Royal

Institute in 2014.

Al Hafi is fluent in both English and Hebrew and served as an academic adviser the RoyakInstitut. He has participated in many training courses, conferences and symposia. He has lectured in scientific forums and is a member of many research and charitable institutions, such as the Advisory Board of the Religions Foundation, Beirut, since 2015 and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Royal Institute for Religious Studies in Amman since 2014. He has served as a member of many committees and has participated in the preparation and presentation of numerous television and radio programs such as "An Hour for Love", "Thirty Ramadan", "Thought and Culture", "Religion and Life" among others.

Al-Hafi holds a professorship in Islamic Sciences (Comparative Religion) from the University of Prince Abdelkader Al-Jazairi, Constantine, Algeria, in 1989, and his PhD in Fundamentals of Religion, Religions and Doctrines of Zaytouna University, Tunis, Tunisia, 1996. Religion, in 2003 from the University of Zaytouna in Tunisia.



Azmi Mahafza

The President of the University of Jordan, Mahafaza has assumed many academic and professional positions. He is a member of many boards and committees. He has many achievements such as the establishment of the Clinical Skills Center and the Laboratory of Molecular Biology at the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Jordan. He set the specifications of the educational program in the Faculty of Medicine and led its curriculum modification efforts from traditional to integrated at the University of Jordan, he also offers many consultations

locally and regionally, and has organized several medical conferences, and has published many scientific researches.

Mahafza holds a doctorate in medicine from the University of Damascus, a PhD in basic medical sciences from the American University of Beirut, a fellowship in virology from Bell University in America, and the Jordanian Board of Clinical Laboratory Medicine.



Abu Yarub Mohammed Habib Al Marzouki

Tunisian philosopher, Professor and advisor to the Prime Minister of the First Revolution and an elected member of the Tunisian National Constituent Assembly and a member of the Department of Islamic Sciences of the House of Government, specializing in Arabic, Greek and German philosophy.

Al Marzouki assumed many positions: a professor of philosophy at the Faculty of Arts - Tunis I University,

Director of the Institute of Translation (Bait Al Hikmeh) in Tunisia, Professor of philosophy at the International Islamic University Malaysia, and has more than one hundred researches and studies in Arabic, French and English in intellectual Arab and humanitarian issues

Al Marzouqi has many books, including: al-Ghazali's concept of causation, Aristotelian philosophy or the status of mathematics in Aristotelian scientific discourse, the Khaldun theoretical Sociology, contemporary Arab history, jurisprudence and alternative pathology. He also translated a number of philosophical references, including the translation of the book of sources of Arabic philosophy, the translation of the book of Anasah, and the translation of the book of the summary into the philosophical dilemmas: the problem of the foundation and rationality of philosophy and the philosophy of religion by Hegel. Marzouki was given Sheikh Zayed's Award for his translation of Hurssals firstbook in Phenomenology.

Marzouki is a graduate of the Higher Teachers' House and the first Tunisian University. He holds a degree in philosophy from the Sorbonne University. He holds a degree in law from the Sorbonne and a doctorate in Arabic and Greek philosophy from the first Tunisian University.



Bassel Ibrahim Al Tarawneh

The Government Coordinator for Human Rights in the Jordanian Prime Ministry and the Chairman of the Governmental Committee for the Follow-up of Human Rights Recommendations.

Tarawneh was chosen to hold several positions and memberships including: Vice-President of the Board of Trustees of the Supreme Council for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and a member of its Board of

Trustees by a decision of the Council of Ministers. He is also a member of each of the following committeesby a decision of the Council of Ministers: The Jordanian National Committee for Women's Affairs the National Team for the Protection of the Family against Violence. He is also a member and a Rapporteur of the Committee for Preparing the Comprehensive National Human Rights Plan by a decision of the Prime Minister and a member of the Supreme Steering Committee Security Council No. 1325 (Women, Security and Peace) by a decision of the Council of Ministers and a member of the National Committee for Criminal Justice by a decision of the Council of Ministers. Tarawneh was also appointed head of the Fact-Finding Committee on Domestic Violence by a decision of the National Family Protection Team from Violence and Chairman of the Follow-up and Inspection Committee by a decision of the Board of Trustees of the National Council for Family Affairs. And a member of the Board of Directors of the Syrian-Jordanian Free Zone (representing the Jordanian Government).

Al-Tarawneh worked in several institutions and held several positions including: General Manager of Jordan Media Center (four years), Assistant to the President of Mutah University (three years) and Advisor to Radio and Television Corporation and Amman Municipality. And an adviser to the Prime Minister / Prime Ministry (for seven years). And an executive director of Al-Arab Al-Youm, Al-Bilad newspaper and others (for three years) (private sector) previously. Al Tarawanah was previously a member of the board of trustees of the Royal Society of Fine Arts and a member of several national and international councils and bodies in the field of human rights, media, development, youth and a member of the Board of Trustees of the American University of Education / Beirut (five years).



FatmehCharafeddine

Lebanese academic, Charafeddine heads the Research and Instruction department at the American University of Beirut. She manages a project to compile and build a website featuring the personal papers donated to the University Libraries by a Lebanese politician, she also managed the Index Nahda journals project. She holds a M.A. Department of Middle Eastern and Islamic Studies, University of Toronto, Ontario, Canada and M.L.S. Graduate School of Library and Information Science, Simmons College, USA.

She published: Contemporary Lebanese Feminist Literature: Studies of Bibliography / Prepared by Hania Osiran, Fatima Charafeddin, supervised by Samira Agassi. Beirut: Lebanese American University, Institute of Women's Studies in the Arab Year.



Fahima Sharaf al – Din

An independent consultant and researcher, and a professor at the Faculty of Social Sciences at the Lebanese University. She has many researches in social and political sciences, especially in the field of women's issues in Lebanon and the Arab world.

Sharaf Aldin has provided her experiencers in the field of human rights and the integration of the gender to

many international organizations and UN agencies such as ESCWA, UNEVEM, UNDP and UNESCO, she holds the position of vice president of the National Commission for Follow-up on Women's Issues and is also the editor of the Arab Thought Magazine, Director of Research at the Institute of Arab Development, and Director General of the Institute of Arab Development.

Sharaf El Din holds several honorary posts and memberships, including a founding member of the Lebanese Women's Network, the Secretary General of the Arab Society for Sociology, a member of the Editorial Board of Qadaia and others. She also has many publications, including: The Situation of Lebanese Women Married to Non-Lebanese, and has published many studies dealing with violence against women and the problems of the Lebanese family and the position of women, the impact of programs and activities related to human rights on culture in Lebanon, and has more than 25 books and many published studies covering the basis of Arab culture and women's issues.

Sharaf Aldinn holds a BA degree and a master's degree in Philosophy from the Lebanese University in Lebanon, a second master's degree and a PhD in political philosophy from a university in France and a PhD in philosophy from the same university.



Hassan Nafaa

An Egyptian researcher and thinker, Nafaa is currently serving as a full professor in the Political Science Department at the Faculty of Economics and Political Science at Cairo University, where he was its president for eight years. He has worked as a visiting professor at many universities and as a lecturer in several diplomatic institutes affiliated to the foreign ministries in Egypt and a number of Arab countries. He served as Secretary General of the Arab Thought Forum, Secretary General of the Arab Society for Political Science, General

Coordinator of the Egyptian Campaign Against Inheritance and then of the National Assembly for Change. He is a member of the advisory board of Al-Ahram International Journal of Politics.

Nafaa won many awards including the State Encouragement Award in Political Science and the State Prize for Excellence in Social Sciences. He is a member of the General Secretariat of the Arab National Conference.

He has many publications: Reform of the United Nations, Arabs and UNESCO, the United Nations in half a century, Western Europe and North America, Egypt and the Arab-Israeli conflict: from inevitable conflict to impossible settlement, the European Union and Arab lessons learned, and has also published numerous studies and articles in several magazines and newspapers. He contributes regular articles in several Arabic newspapers.

He holds a BA in Political Science from the Faculty of Commerce, Alexandria University, and a PhD in Political Science from Sorbonne University, France.



Hassan Hanafi

An Egyptian thinker and academic, one of the most important theoreticians of the Islamic left movement, and Phenomenology, and one of the modern Arab thinkers who launched Arab intellectual projects, he studied in several Arab and foreign universities and headed the philosophy department at Cairo University. He has several publications in Arabic, English and French. He served as a scientific advisor at the United Nations University in Tokyo from 1985-1987. Hanafi is Vice-President of the Arab Philosophical Society and Secretary

General of the Egyptian Philosophical Society.

Hanafi has served in the following academic posts: Professor of Philosophy at the Faculty of Arts, Cairo University, Visiting Professor at the University of Templ, Philadelphia, Assistant Professor of Philosophy, Professor of Philosophy, Faculty of Arts, Cairo University, Visiting Professor at the University of Tokyo, Japan, Visiting Professor of philosophy at the Faculty of Arts in Fez, Morocco, In the Faculty of Arts - Cairo University.

Hanafi has several books, including: "Our Position on Ancient Heritage: Heritage and Innovation", "Dialogue of Generations", "From Copying to Creativity", "The Encyclopedia of Arab Islamic Civilization", "Introduction to Phenomenology" and "From dissolution to permanence" "From Copying to Reasoning" and "The Sanctuary of Time". He was awarded the State Appreciation Award in Social Sciences in 2009 and the Great Nile Prize in Social Sciences in 2015 for his scientific activity. He was one of the signatories of the open letter in October 2007 from Muslim thinkers to Christian leaders, "We are all equal between us." He was awarded the Prize of the Free Thinker of Poland, and the Shirazi Prize of President Khatami.

Hanafi received his doctorate in philosophy from the Sorbonne University in 1966. After graduating from the Department of Philosophy at the Faculty of Arts, Cairo University in 1956, he traveled to France immediately before the tripartite aggression against Egypt after the nationalization of the Suez Canal.



Ibtisam Al-Kitbi

An Emirati academic and a professor of political science at the UAE University. She is one of the leading women in politics and scientific research in the Arab world, Al-Kitbi is the founder and president of the Emirates Center for Policy and the first Arab woman to become the head of the think tank and research center. She has been a member of several committees, such as the Advisory Board of the Emirates Center for Strategic Studies (IISS) between 1998-2002, and member of the Population Structure Committee of the Federal
